News from Lesotho



Newly established group

The LORD of the harvest that is God the Father... “sent out labourers into the harvest” (Mt 9:38). Vocations are born in prayer; and only through prayer can they persevere and bear fruit.

We are a group of affiliates in the Southern Region of Lesotho, about 172 km. from Maseru, the Capital City .We had been showing in different ways that we like this Congregation and we attended the jubilee at St. Rodrigue when the affiliates celebrated their 25th Anniversary. We pleaded with Sr. ArmelinaTsiki to enrol us as we strongly felt that we would not leave without being part of the Good Shepherd Affiliation. She promised to come to Mohale’s Hoek. On the 3rd September 2016, Sr. Armelina accompanied by two of the National Committee members, Mrs. Mathabo Ranyamatsana and Mr. Phosholi Lesala visited us. We held our first meeting at Bishop’s House. We were six, Sr Eusebia Mphoso our Mentor, Mrs ‘Marethabile Lydia Kelane, Miss Sebina Lebona, Mrs. Nthabiseng Tlali and Mr. Mojakhomo Patick Salang.

As new members, we felt motivated and loved as we learned that the motivating force in our lives comes from a sense of being loved by God and feeling particularly attracted to Christ in the Shepherding expression of His love. We also learned that our service, traditionally and currently, is particularly with women and children who have been wounded by life’s circumstances and live on the edge of society. As affiliates, we have to bear in mind the principle that each person is loved by God in a unique way. Today more than ever, we see the value and interconnection of all creation. Spirituality is the only way to live and express our faith actively. We want to recite the rosary daily.

Achivements:

We have sent one wounded girl to the Good Shepherd Centre for the teenage Mothers with her six-month-old baby boy to learn life-skills on how to take care of herself and the baby and supplement her COSC January this year 2017. Hopefully by 2019 she will be graduating.

- We have visited the homes of child-headed families and provide them with food and some of their basic needs.
- We were taking care of the baby who lost her mother. She had congenital abnormalities and the family abandoned her. We advocated that social development should assist, and eventually she was taken to a specialized home for palliative care.
- We are meeting every 2nd Sunday of the church calendar.

Challenges

- We were five in number when we started; however two went away to seek jobs in other districts but they are still part of us when they are home. As for Mr... he has not attended our meetings, and we are praying that he may join us soon.

Conclusion

- “We are troubled on every side, yet not distressed we are perplexed but not in despair, persecuted but not forsaken, cast down but not destroyed” (2 Co 4:8-9).

On the 6th November 2016 we visited the prisoners. We had Mass by Fr. Vincent Mosenye OMI. We had brought some small presents which they appreciated a lot. On the same day we also visited Mohlomi Hospital for mentally disturbed patients. We gave them small, simple gifts.

Good news from Brazil



During our visit to our sisters in Brazil, Sister Agnès Dufour and I had the joy of meeting with affiliated members representing the three groups in this country: Natal, Baia Formosa and Jardim de Piranhas.

The life of each group is tangible not only by their attendance at monthly meetings but by their concern for new members and their commitment in the town.

Forty-two (42) affiliates and sixteen (16)

pre-affiliates are involved in communicating love and goodness to the tones of mercy. These include: participation in parish and diocesan initiatives for the poor, weekly adoration, organization of retreats and prayer time together, presence with the sisters at festivals and community events, family visits, a Mass to the intentions of the affiliated members on the 16th of each month, intergroup communications. Several expressed their appreciation for the *2016-2017 Annual Spiritual Guide* and their appreciation for the invitation to write in the book proposed by Donna Towle. This initiative allowed them to rename the reasons why they continue to be members of the Good Shepherd Affiliation, to belong to our spiritual family.

They asked me to greet affiliates everywhere; which I am doing here with pleasure. In order for the Good Shepherd's face to remain visible to the world, I ask Him to strengthen each affiliate in his/her call to make of our groups **cells of fraternity and spiritual growth** for the happiness of all .

We remembered the 167th anniversary of foundation with a souvenir that surprised and interested everyone, the tradition of “the row of pins as a New Year’s present.” To illustrate it, we had prepared for each one a sheet of Christmas and seasonal songs, decorated with small symbols of Christmas.



We found tartan fabric in which we set 3 straight pins in parallel. We inserted the fabric in the song sheet. We added a brief written description of this tradition:

- God invites me tirelessly but never imposes himself. He respects my freedom; there is no love without freedom.
- I feel invited to review my commitments: am I merciful in his image? The kind of mercy that invites the one who crosses my path, that mercy which makes me kneel before my brothers and sisters, which makes me become His instrument.
- Yes, the time of mercy has come.
- I left with joy in my heart, well aware and determined that mercy may be translated into deeds in my life, with the help of the Holy Spirit.

➤ Celebration of Consecrated Life

On Sunday, January 29, 2017, on the World Day of Consecrated Life, H el ene Tardif and I from the Affiliate Group of Charlesbourg attended the gathering held at the Church of the Holy Canadian Martyrs in Quebec City. The theme of that day: “Carried by the joy of the Gospel, becoming missionaries otherwise”. The day is celebrated in Quebec City since 1999.

Father Bertrand Roy, a former missionary in Indonesia and Cambodia, developed the theme for us. He emphasized the texts of the bishops of Quebec in 2016: "The missionary turn of Christian communities." He reminded us of the essence of our faith and the simplicity of the Gospel, along with the importance of discernment in recognizing those essential elements. Likewise, the joy of the Gospel must bring us to the Christian community: we cannot be Christians alone, salvation is communal. The joy of the Gospel leads us to “step away”, to leave our comfort and our habits. This joy leads us to initiate, to create, to make new, to be prophets, to raise new dawns in the mornings of tomorrow... There are things that must disappear such as nostalgia for the past, the “Savior” mentality, sadness, discouragement. The Church does not have it all, says Father Roy, “it is not God”!

What must continue is the discernment to distinguish what is essential from what is secondary, the testimony and joy of our faith, openness to differences, and quality before quantity. We must become close to one another, become prophets of hope.

In our group exchanges we emphasized: "being witnesses of hope." One lady suggested that we should give more attention to silence filled with the presence of God.

The afternoon ended with Solemn Vespers of the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple presided by Bishop Louis Corriveau and sung by the Dominican Missionary Adorers. There was also a renewal of vows by the assembly which included a large number of religious men and women, lay people, and many Good Shepherd Sisters.
